Complimenting tips could make a person's day

March 1, 2022, was Compliment Day. Even with this special day in our past, we can still work to celebrate it. Compliments build relationships, and make you a person that someone looks forward to seeing, each and every day! However, compliments can be tricky. A lot of people struggle with how to give a compliment that comes across as sincere, not to mention the stress of receiving one properly. Here are some tips and tricks that will help you become a complement giving/receiving master.

- Don't just give a compliment because you think it will help you get out of hot water. Instead, tie it to something you genuinely feel to make it authentic.
- When you want to give a genuine compliment, tie it to something that someone cares about. For example, compliment a football player on their win the other day. Do NOT compliment them on something related to you. When you put yourself in a compliment, it's less genuine and you are not really complimenting the person.
- Keep it specific. Do not say something like you look nice today. Instead, say something like I really like how you paired those black jeans with that red top.
- When complimenting someone, it is advisable to do it in a stress-free environment, like after completing a project. This will create the best dynamic possible.

Giving a compliment is hard, but receiving can be just as tricky! You might feel awkward, surprised, and these emotions might make it hard to give the right response, at the right moment.

The best way to receive a compliment is by thanking the person personally. It is OK to return the compliment, but doing so might make the other person feel like you are complimenting them just to be polite.

Here is an example of giving and receiving a compliment.

Jordan and Michael were walking down the hall,

tired but excited after finishing their school play. Michael played the lead role, and he sang brilliantly. "I really liked how you sang your solo in the fifth scene. Did you spend a lot of time preparing for it?" said Jordan.

"Thank you! I did spend a lot of time working on it. I noticed you practicing yesterday for your role in the gym. I saw that your solo was pretty tough with those high notes. What technique did you use to practice?"

This example is really good because the compliment flows into the conversation, is specific, and carries on the conversation, too.

Compliments might be difficult, but when you give one correctly you can make someone's day!

A: I've coached everything from varsity hockey, football and track to middle school girls and boys basketball and even varsity girls golf. I really like spending time with students doing things they enjoy


